26 Tips to Make You a Better Moodler

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Hello, I'm Scott

- - I gotta talk fast
- I'm Scott.
 - That's all you need to know.

Why 26 Tips?

 - Moodle tip or trick.

- 26 tips is a years' worth of "Fortnightly" homework.



Tip 1: Make a backup

- Immediately after watching these tips, go make a backup
 - Specifically of your Moodle courses, but let's be honest, when was the last time you backed up everything?
 - World Backup Day March 31. Put it in your calendar. Now. Right now.
 - Set it to repeat every 6 months at least.
- Backup your Moodle courses.
 - Teachers can do this. Take the responsibility for doing your backup. Assume your Moodle Admin won't.
 - Admins can do this. Assume your Teachers won't.



Tip 2: Register your Moodle

- important security upgrades.
- Don't register a dev site (i.e. a sandbox site)

You'll receive email when there are new versions and

It'll make your life easier when installing plugins too.





Tip 3: Follow the Moodle YouTube account

- https://www.youtube.com/user/moodlehg •
- Great new feature videos for new versions.
- They also release videos of selected presentations from MoodleMoots run by Moodle HQ
 - <u>Check out this awesome guy's presentation!</u>
- There's some other great Moodle flavoured YouTube channels
 - Check out <u>HRDNZ</u> for some MoodleBites!
 - Pukunui has the <u>iMoot archives</u> on YouTube.



Tip 4: Switch your format

- I see many people stuck in a Weekly Format.
 - Don't be afraid to change your format.
 - I find Topics Format works better for the courses I build.
- There are many (many!) <u>course format plugins</u>.
 - My favourites include <u>Grid</u> and <u>Onetopic</u>.
- Hey, is there an iMoot presentation on this?
 - Horses (course topics) for courses by Dom!



Tip 5: Learn to use the question bank

- The <u>question bank</u> is so incredibly useful, I can't believe it when I find someone who doesn't know about it!
- Build a huge bank of questions.
- Build a quiz that draws n random questions from the question bank.
 - Students get random & different questions in their quiz.
- Use the categories in the Question Bank
 - You can draw n random questions from category X.
 - Great for my ASQA compliance draw 3 random questions from a category that covers unit ICTWEB401, Element 1
 - Categories can go across the course, category, and site level
 - Standardise your questions!



Tip 6: Learn how to use the gradebook

- Can you believe I used to never use the gradebook?
- Extremely powerful.
 - Students can see feedback for how they're doing in the course.
 - You can categorise your grade items.
 - You can select the best 4 out of 5 quizzes.
- Super powerful!





Tip 7: Learn about badges

- Badges are fun ways to engage your learners.
 - Think of girl guide or boy scout badges.
 - Can be given for completing activities or courses, or manually issued.
 - Can set an expiry date
 - Student of the Week that expires after 7 days.
- Incredibly easy to set up a <u>badge in Moodle</u>.
 - Want a badge? You might already have one!
- makebadg.es is a great site for creating a badge for the graphicdesignically impaired.
- Take badges across sites using Mozilla Backpack.





Tip 8: Turn on completion tracking

- Completion tracking is so helpful.
 - Edit Settings > Completion tracking > Enable completion tracking
- You can set conditions which indicate when an activity has been completed by the student.
- It's worth it for the Completion Report alone.
 - At a glance see if students have completed activities!
- There's a Fortnightly Tip <u>on this topic!</u>



Tip 9: Learn how to use Restrict Access creatively

- Restrict Access is awesome.
- Restrict a student's ability to interact with an Activity or Resource or hide it away entirely!
- Based on Date, Group, Grade, User Profile information, or Activity Completion or a combination of all of these.
 - Display a midterm break message only during midterm break.
 - Display a tab only to users with emails ending in @pukunui.com
 - Delivery Topic 2 only when the Quiz for Topic 1 is complete.
- Some <u>fantastic plugins</u> extend this even more!

Tip 10: Learn to love those things you hate

- I hate the Database activity.
- Hard to use, time consuming. Why would anyone ever want to use this?
- BREAK OUT OF YOUR SHELL!
- Challenge yourself!
- Stop using only the Activities and Resources you love, try using one you hate this week.





Tip 11: Kill your darlings

- When film makers are editing their movies they occasionally have to kill their darlings.
 - Scenes that they love but do not fit the flow of the film.
- This can be applied to your Moodle course.
 - Is there something you love, something that is well crafted, but does not fit the flow of the course?
 - You know you have material like this.
 - You need the courage to kill it.
- You know what, this is probably true of many aspects of your life.
 - Just saying. •





Tip 12: Make a template course

- Make a template category on your Moodle.
- Build the perfect course in here.
 - Add all those cool bells and whistles.
 - The Activity Completions and Conditional Topics.
 - The beautiful teacher intro sections like the one I build using Bootstrap in my other presentation.
 - Do A/B testing with your team.
 - Backup and restore from this template course when building a new one.
 - Or just import the pieces you need!



Tip 13: Did you know you can Import Groups?

I was out on a consult and the client had a need to use the same groups across multiple courses. Cohorts wouldn't suit their needs for reasons I won't go into here.

Client: "We just made a backup that included only the groups, and then we restore this into the target courses. Are we doing it right?"

Scott: "That's brilliant!"



Tip 14: Be cool about copyright

- I need a photo of Sydney. I'll just do a Google Images search and use whatever comes up, right?
- You can't just grab whatever photos you find off the Internet.
 - You could buy some stock images if you have the dough.
 - Look into <u>Creative Commons</u>.
 - Don't just take, consider putting your material back into the Creative Commons!
- Not just pictures!
 - Has anyone ever played "wait music" in their BBB/Connect session while waiting for students? Hmmm???



Tip 15: Get a dev Moodle

- Dev Moodle = Development Moodle
- You do not want to try weird things on your live "Production Moodle"
 - I always break things.
 - Destroying student data is usually a bad thing.
- Set up another server
 - AWS micro instance.
 - Local instance (available from <u>Moodle Downloads</u> page) At the very least, build a Sandpit category that students don't have •
 - access to.





Tip 16: Try to break your dev Moodle

- Hey, if you have a Dev Moodle, go nuts!
- Install weird plugins, see if they work.
- Try a crazy theme, flick all the switches and twist all the dials.
- Use this for your A/B testing.
- Use this to try adding HTML/CSS/Bootstrap/JavaScript
 - OMG, can a teacher include JavaScript in a label?
 - Let's find out!!
- Go nuts. Break your Dev Moodle.



Tip 17: Learn a little HTML, CSS and Bootstrap

- If you really want your course to look sweet, you're going to need to get your hands dirty.
- HTML and CSS are the languages of the web.
 - Wherever there's an ATTO editor in Moodle, you can edit the HTML code.
- Bootstrap is a great way to add design elements to your course with the minimum work.
 - Many themes include Bootstrap Boost, Essential are examples.
 - Let Bootstrap inspire you! •

Tip 18: Try some plugins

- The M in Moodle is for Modular!
- Trying <u>new plugins</u> is a great use for your Dev Moodle.
 - Themes, Course Formats, Question Types, Activity Restrictions, Assignment Submission Methods, the list goes on and on.
- There's a great iMoot presentation on this: <u>The Top 50 Moodle</u> Plugins by Stuart
- Why try on your Dev and not Production?
 - Well... sometimes things go wrong.
 - Bad thing to happen 2 hours before a major exam.



Tip 19: Sign up for a MOOC

- What's a MOOC?
 - Multiple Open Online Course
- Moodle's MOOC site: <u>https://learn.moodle.net/</u>
- A Free Moodle Mobile MOOC? <u>http://mobile.moodlebites.com/</u>
 - Just started-ish (May 1st)
- open!

• An online course **you** can join and learn something cool!

Tip 20: Listen to a Moodle podcast

Are you a podcast listener?

I am a huge podcast listener. Daily I'm listening to my Canadian news podcasts, and lots of fun ones too. But did you know there's a Moodle podcast?

Tip 21: Join the MUA

- Why not join the <u>Moodle Users Association</u>?
- Not-for-Profit organisation which helps support Moodle.
 - Members can put forward project proposals for new additions to Moodle.
 - Members have a vote to which project to pursue that cycle.
 - A great way to get involved and support the development of Moodle.
- \$110 yearly.



Tip 22: Go to a Moot or a meetup

- Hey, you're here! Congrats!
- iMoot is awesome, but why not also attend a real life Moot or Meetup?
 - The <u>Moodle Calendar</u> has upcoming Moots.
 - I've personally been to Australian, New Zealand and Japanese Moots. And I love it! So many other moodlers to meet and share with!
- Maybe there's a Moodle Meetup group near you



Tip 23: Socialise at a moot

- Your Moot experience will suck if you hide in the corner.
- Be brave, and go meet people.
 - Introduce yourself to a speaker you enjoyed in the hallway track.
 - Talk to the people sitting near you in the conference hall during the breaks.
 - Attend the social events.
- Get a Twitter account and tweet on the hashtag.
 - I cannot stress this enough this is how you'll make new friends
- Hang out in Oranges Cafe and tweet on #iMoot17.



Tip 24: Go to a non-Moodle conference or meetup

- To be a better Moodle, you need to push yourself beyond Moodle.
 - Don't get trapped in a bubble. Find inspiration elsewhere.
 - There are plenty of other education conferences.
 - ASCILITE, EduTech, FLANZ, NCVER
 - There are plenty of other tech conferences.
 - WordCamp, LinuxConf, DrupalCon, BuzzConf
 - Tap into deeper inspiration. Find the non-Moodle things here, and bring them back to our community.



Tip 25: Present at a moot

- Everyone has a story to share.
- Share your story.
 - Be brave, submit a proposal.

I expect and demand you answer the call for proposals for the next iMoot.
