We have a Cohort of New Employees

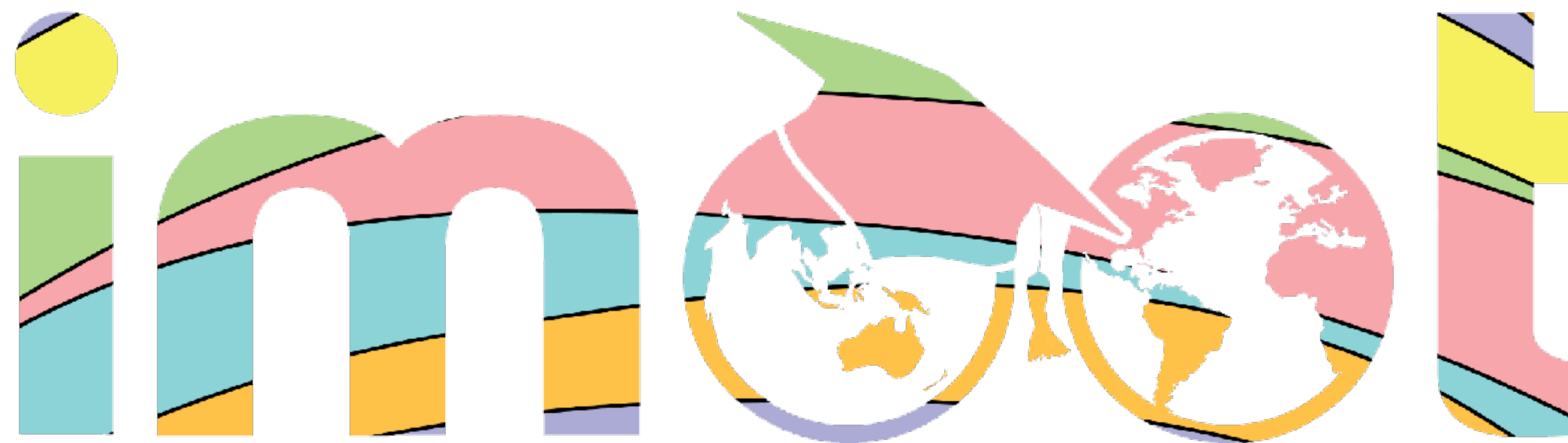
- These are all employees that we have hired recently in a recruitment drive

- Add the New Employees Lesson Plan to the Cohort

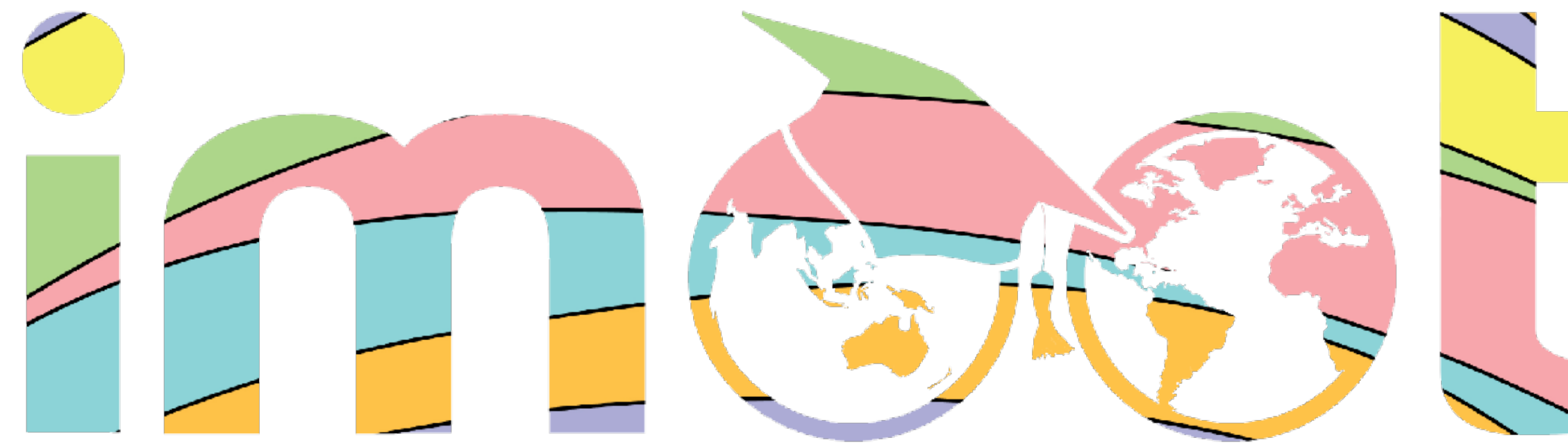
Let's add competencies to our Induction Course

- We need to link existing competencies to our course
- We also can link these competencies then to Activities in our course
- We can
 - Automatically complete the competency
 - Attach evidence, or
 - Send the competency for review
